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Leonid Hanin* (hanin@isu.edu). *Distribution of the number of clonogenic tumor cells surviving fractionated radiation.*

What is the form of the probability distribution for the number of clonogenic tumor cells surviving fractionated radiotherapy? Assuming that (a) tumor is exposed to a sequence of n equal doses separated by equal time intervals; (b) all tumor cells survive each exposure with the same probability s , given that they survived previous exposures; and (c) kinetics of tumor cell population between fractions of radiation is governed by a homogeneous birth and death process, we find, for any non-random initial tumor population size i , an explicit formula for the distribution of the number M of surviving clonogenic cells at the end of treatment. Several limiting forms of this distribution are obtained. In particular, it is shown that if $i \rightarrow \infty$ and $s^n \rightarrow 0$ so that is^n tends to a finite positive limit then the distribution of random variable M converges to a Poisson distribution which generalizes the classical theorem about the Poisson limit of a sequence of binomial distributions. Under natural assumptions on post-treatment tumor development, the distribution of the time to tumor recurrence is computed and used to estimate the model parameters from data on survival of patients treated for prostate cancer.
