This research is concerned with estimation problems regarding nonparametric regression functions that are not necessarily directly observed. Practical examples are abundant; for instance one may want to infer about the weight distribution of a cable of which only the shape is known. In general one may think of an input-output system, where one wants to recover an unknown parameter of the input. At least two measurement designs can be employed: random design, where the points at which the output function is observed are chosen according to a random mechanism; or deterministic design where these points are chosen essentially error free by the observer (for instance equally distant points in the unit interval). The random design model leads statistically to independent and identically distributed observations. This is no longer true for the deterministic design where the data are independents but not identically distributed. Therefore the latter situation is mathematically somewhat harder to deal with than the former, and most of the results in the literature, whenever available at all in this rather complicated model, are usually formulated and proved for the independent and identically distributed case.
