Partisan Fairness in Districting. Preliminary report.

A basic principle of fairness is legislative districting is partial symmetry: the expected number of seats that party A receives given X% of the vote should be the same as the expected number of seats that party B would receive if it received X%. We discuss applications of this principle and two places where it breaks down or needs to be extended: (1) settings where parties are geographically distributed in dissimilar ways, and (2) settings where it is not plausible that the two parties will get the same share of the vote.
