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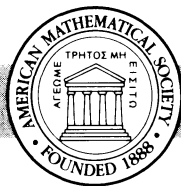

Preface

This volume contains papers in final form from the American Mathematical Society special session on combinatorial group theory—infinite groups held at the University of Maryland April 1988. This session was organized by A. Gaglione of the Naval Academy, C. Y. Tang of the University of Waterloo, and B. Fine of Fairfield University. This special session was designed to bring together researchers in various areas of infinite group theory, especially combinatorial group theory, to share methods and results.

We were impressed with the vitality and interest in infinite group theory as reflected in this conference. There were eighteen speakers at the session, and the talks covered a wide range of group theory from purely logical questions to geometric methods. For many reasons—a large number originating in topological and geometric results—there is heightened interest in classical combinatorial group theory and its questions. This was reflected by the sheer volume of work presented at the conference.

The papers in this volume represent a mix of pure research papers and expository papers. In keeping with what we feel is the spirit of the Contemporary Mathematics series we hope that the majority of the papers are clear enough to the nonspecialist to convey a sense of the direction of the field. Some of the papers of course contain entirely new results and the editors wish to thank the participants for using this volume as an outlet for their work.

While no single volume can present the total state of affairs in modern combinatorial group theory we hope that this work will serve as an entry point for people interested in learning where the discipline is.

We wish to thank the referees for their dedicated work in evaluating the papers. We would also like to thank Connie Engle, Pat Struse, and Diane Berezowski for their fine typing job.
