THE ANNUAL MEETING IN CHICAGO

The seventy-second Annual Meeting of the American Mathematical Society was held at the Sherman House Hotel in Chicago, Illinois, on Monday through Thursday, January 24–27, 1966, in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of the Mathematical Association of America. Registration at the meetings was 2,609, including 2,079 members of the Society.

The thirty-ninth Josiah Willard Gibbs Lecture, *Stellar evolution*, was delivered at 8:00 P.M. on Monday, January 24, by Professor Martin Schwarzschild of Princeton University. Dean A. A. Albert, President of the Society, introduced Professor Schwarzschild.

At 3 P.M. on Wednesday, January 26, Professor J. L. Doob, Past President of the Society, gave his retiring Presidential Address, *Application to analysis of a topological definition of smallness of a set*. Professor Doob was introduced by Professor C. B. Morrey.

By invitation of the Committee to Select Hour Speakers for Annual and Summer Meetings, addresses were given by Professor Richard Askey, of the University of Wisconsin, on Norm inequalities for some orthogonal expansions and by Professor George Glauberman, of the University of Chicago, on Sylow 2-subgroups of finite groups. Professor Askey was introduced by Professor I. J. Schoenberg, and Professor Glauberman by Professor R. H. Bruck.

At 2:00 P.M. on Monday, January 24, the third award of the Veblen Prize in Geometry was made. The Prize was divided, one half going to Professor Stephen Smale, of the University of California, Berkeley, for his contributions to various aspects of differential topology, and the other half going to Professors Morton Brown, of the University of Michigan, and Barry Mazur, of Harvard University, for their work on the generalized Schoenflies theorem. The Prize was awarded by Professor S. S. Chern, Chairman of the Selection Committee for the Veblen Prize. Professors Smale and Brown gave brief descriptions of the prize winning work; Professor Mazur was prevented by bad weather from being present.

There were four sessions of selected twenty-minute papers. The special session on Partial Differential Equations, organized by Professor Felix Browder, had papers by Robert Seeley, James Serrin, Tosio Kato, Felix Browder, and Edward Nelson. The special session on Markov Processes, arranged by Professor Wendell Fleming, had papers by F. B. Knight, John Lamperti, S. C. Port, Y. S. Chow and H. E. Robbins, R. E. Gangolli, and Stephen Orey and Benton Jamison. The special session on Combinatorial Mathematics, arranged by Professor Herbert Ryser, presented papers by R. H. Bruck, D. R. Fulkerson and O. A. Gross, Gian-Carlo Rota, Victor Klee and D. W. Walkup, and Marvin Marcus. The special session on Algebraic Groups, arranged by Professor Robert Steinberg, had papers by J. I. Igusa, G. D. Mostow, Takashi Ono, T. A. Springer, and E. J. Taft.

The Secretary reported that the Board of Trustees approved the recommendation of the Council that the Society defray, when other

funds are not available, the travelling expenses of Members to Council Meetings in order to encourage attendance. The extent of the support is to be consistent with that of the Mathematical Association of America to its Board of Governors—five cents a mile.

The Executive Director reported that the Symposium on Singular Integrals to be held at the Chicago, Spring, 1966, meeting, had run into difficulty in obtaining the expected financing from the Office of Naval Research. Fortunately, however, the National Science Foundation was able at a late hour to finance the Symposium with the exception of manuscript fees. President Albert was able to provide funds for these fees from the University of Chicago, which is celebrating its 75th anniversary.

A report was received from President Albert on conversations he had with officials of the Mexican Mathematical Society concerning a possible joint meeting of the two societies in Mexico City. It was reported that the Mexican Mathematical Society had approved the dates November 24 and 25, 1966, for this meeting. The Council also approved these dates, but authorized the appropriate Associate Secretary to make a shift to November 25 and 26, 1966, if it appeared desirable.

The Council approved a proposal of the Bulletin Editorial Committee that the National Science Foundation be asked to continue the program of subsidized expository papers in the BULLETIN.

The Council approved recommendations by the Executive Committee that the Society prepare a Romanian-English vocabulary of mathematical terms and a manual for the translation of mathematical Russian. These publications would be largely for the use of reviewers of Romanian articles for MATHEMATICAL REVIEWS and for translators in the Society's translation program.

The Council approved the recommendation of the Applied Mathematics Committee that the Society sponsor a Summer Seminar in Applied Mathematics in the summer of 1967 on the subject, Mathematics of the Decision Sciences.

Two projects, contemplated by the Conference Board of the Mathematical Sciences were considered and approved by the Council. They were the Colloquium in Education in the Mathematical Sciences, and a series of Regional Symposia in the Mathematical Sciences.

The report of the Joint Committee of the Society and Association on the Graduate Program was received. The Secretary was instructed to negotiate with the Association for the discharge of this committee.

There was a Business Meeting of the Society at 11:00 A.M. on

Monday, January 24. President Albert presided. The Secretary reported briefly on the affairs of the Society and announced the results of the recent election of Officers and Members of the Council. He also reported that A. E. Meder had resigned as a Trustee of the Society and that the Trustees had elected Morton Curtis to the unexpired portion of his term. The Secretary expressed thanks on behalf of the Society to the members of the Local Arrangements Committee, and also to several groups of college student volunteers from Roosevelt College, Rosary College, and Illinois Institute of Technology who had assisted with the registration arrangements.

A question was raised from the floor as to whether consideration was being given to the possibility of changing the Annual Meeting back to the Christmas-New Year period, particularly in view of the fact that many schools were now going on the quarter system. The Secretary reported that the next three annual meetings were already set for late January, but that the Committee on Places of Meetings tried to keep itself informed on the feelings of the members in this regard. However, there did not seem to be any great movement among the members for making this change.

The meeting adjourned at 11:25.
