THE NOVEMBER MEETING IN TAMPA

The six hundred thirty-eighth meeting of the American Mathematical Society was held at the University of South Florida in Tampa, Florida on Friday and Saturday, November 11–12, 1966. There were 210 registrants including 177 members of the Society.

By invitation of the Committee to Select Hour Speakers for South-eastern Sectional Meetings, there were three invited speakers. Professor A. W. Goodman of the University of South Florida, who was introduced by Professor Donald C. Rose, spoke on Open problems on univalent and multivalent functions. Professor F. B. Wright introduced Professor Jacques Dixmier of Tulane University who addressed the Society on the topic Enveloping algebras of Lie algebras. The third speaker was Professor Paul Dedecker from Florida State University who was introduced by Dr. H. F. Kreimer. The title of his address was On the problems of non-abelian cohomology and the philosophy of mathematical science.

Sessions began at 2:15 p.m. on Friday and the Meeting concluded with the last session at 11:35 a.m. on Saturday, November 12th. In all, there were seven sessions for the presentation of contributed papers. Presiding officers were Professors A. T. Brauer, Charles McArthur, Andrew Sobczyk, Nickolas Heerema, J. G. Horne, Jr., James R. Retherford and Don B. Hinton.

There was a reception for members and guests on Friday from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m. at the University Center.
