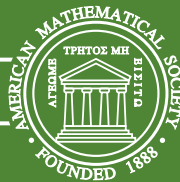

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Book Reviews

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Both types of *Bulletin* articles should be written so as to be understandable by graduate students or mathematicians who are not experts in the subject matter of the article. A well-written expository article will include motivating problems and examples, some indication of the historical development of the subject, and of course the results and open problems that make it an interesting and exciting area of mathematics. In most cases proofs should be at most briefly sketched, and there should be a good bibliography whose main aim is to help those wishing to pursue the subject further. Articles reporting on recent mathematical research should include an introductory section addressed to nonexperts describing the motivation, background, and significance of the results announced.

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
